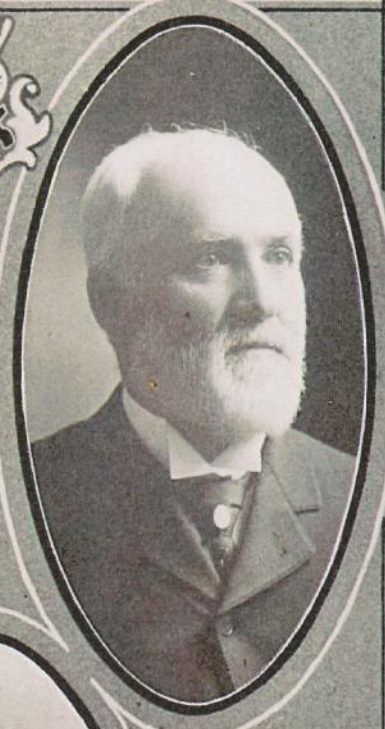

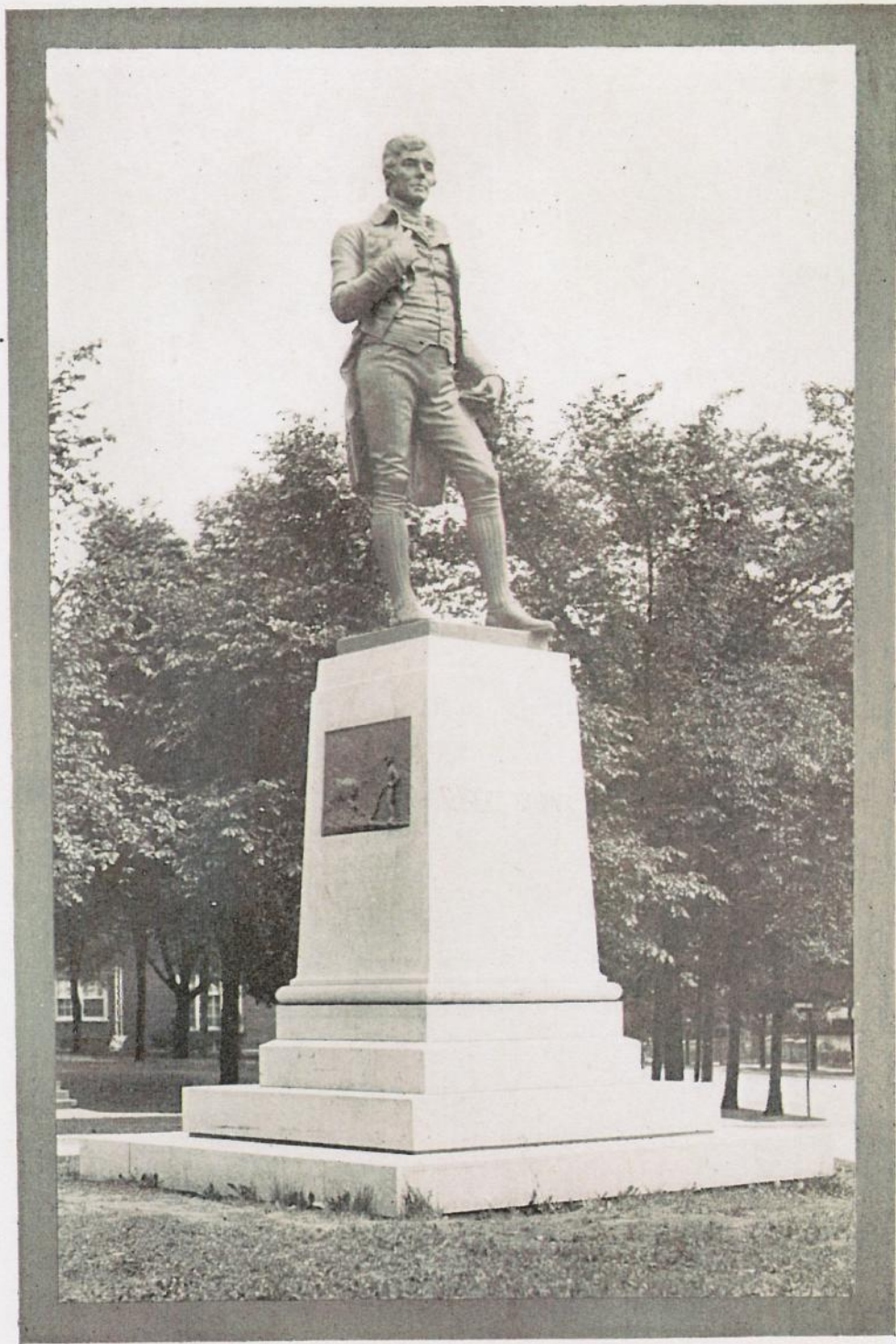

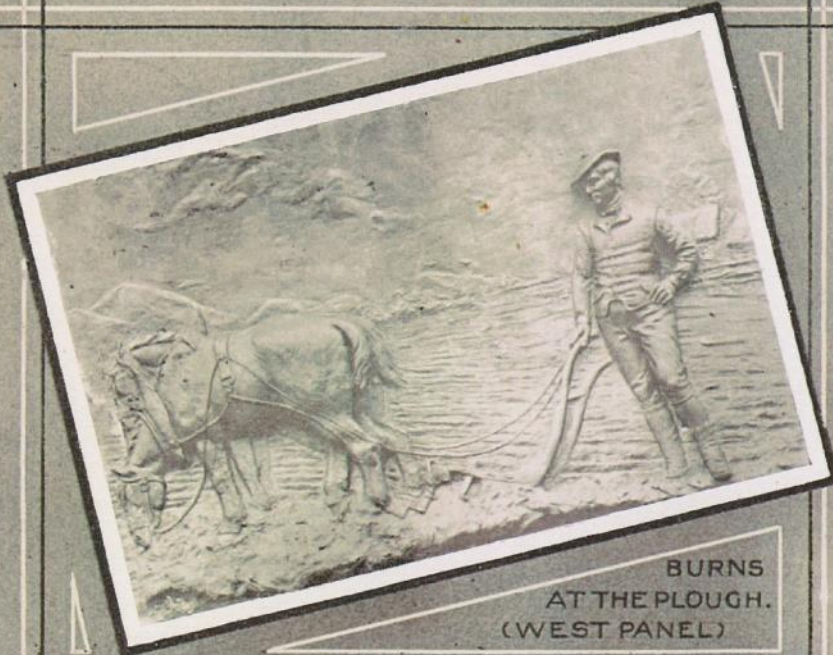


The MONUMENT 

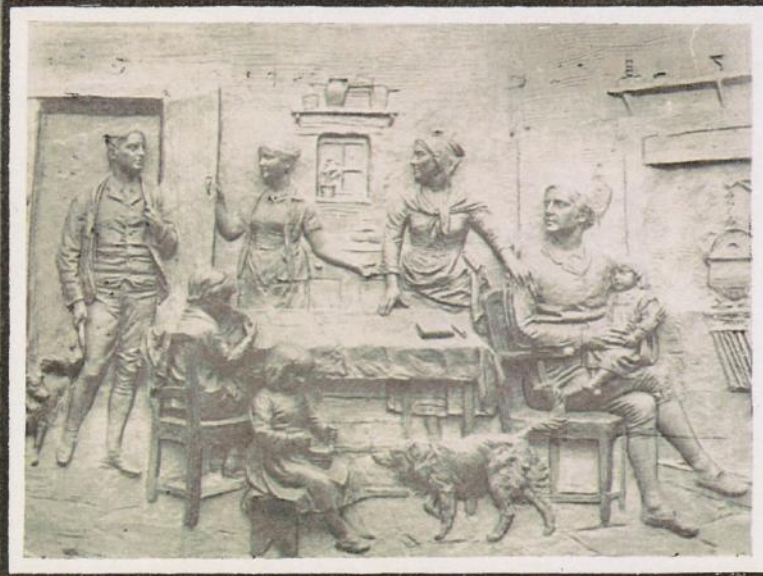
THE SITE of the monument is the triangular space bounded by Franklin Place, Knapp Street and Prospect Avenue.

The monument is of granite and bronze, resting on a concrete foundation weighing thirty tons. The bronze statue of Robert Burns was designed by the eminent sculptor, William Grant Stevenson, R. S. A., of Edinburgh, Scotland. The height of the statue is nearly twelve feet, and it weighs twenty-two hundred pounds. The pedestal, of Nova Scotia pink granite, is eleven feet high and weighs twenty-six tons. It was designed by Julius E. Heimerl, of Milwaukee.

The inscriptions on the Monument are as follows: Front of pedestal, "Robert Burns;" west face of pedestal, beneath bronze panel representing Burns at the plough, "The Poetic Genius of My Country Found Me at the Plough and Threw Her Inspiring Mantle Over Me"; east face of pedestal, beneath panel representing "The Cotter's Saturday Night," "From Scenes Like These Old Scotia's Grandeur Springs;" north face of pedestal, "The Gift of James Anderson Bryden, a Native of Scotland, to the City of His Adoption, 1909."
